



## Nagoya Civic Assembly Hall

Able to hold approximately 3000 people, this grand hall was celebrated as the largest in Japan at the time of its opening in 1930. Having survived the air raids and property seizures of World War II and its succeeding occupation, it remains to this day a popular venue for concerts, lectures, contests, ceremonies, and other large-scale gatherings. The quaint style of the building, with its contrasting lines and arches, is a perfect complement to the greenery of the park. For inquiries, please call 052-731-7191.

## Fountain Tower

The fountain was originally made for the main plaza of the 1910 Kansai Prefectural Cooperative Expo by architect Teiji Suzuki. It blends European and Japanese design, using both Roman-style marble and Japanese rock garden design elements. It was temporarily removed during the construction of the third city subway line, but was restored in 1977 and has become a symbol of the park. It is a registered cultural property of the city of Nagoya, registered in May 1986.



## Universal Suffrage Memorial Stage

An outdoor theater commemorating the establishment of universal suffrage. The Nagoya Shinbun, predecessor to the modern-day newspaper the Chunichi Shinbun, built the stage in 1928 and donated it to the city of Nagoya. Registered cultural property of the City of Nagoya, designated May 1986.

## Kaku-kaku-tei Teahouse

Registered Local Architectural Heritage site, built in 1928  
Built in 1928 as part of an Expo commemorating the ascension of the Showa Emperor, it was originally a model building constructed using the finest Kiso Hinoki available. It was submitted to the Expo by the Nagoya Carpenter's Guild. The adjoining "hyakka-an" teahouse was added in 2000.



## Hyakka-an Tea Room

Registered Local Architectural Heritage site, moved to current location in April 2000  
Originally built at the vacation home of Hyakada's Mr. Yamada at the end of the Taisho Period, it was moved to the current location in 2000 after it was donated to the city by its inheritor Mr. Soneki. The name of the tea room is taken from the classical Zen poem inscribed over the entrance, reading "for whom do the hundred flowers bloom in spring?" The distinctive yellow roof tiles are the craftsmanship of Mr. Nakatani Taniguchi.



## Former Zoo Site

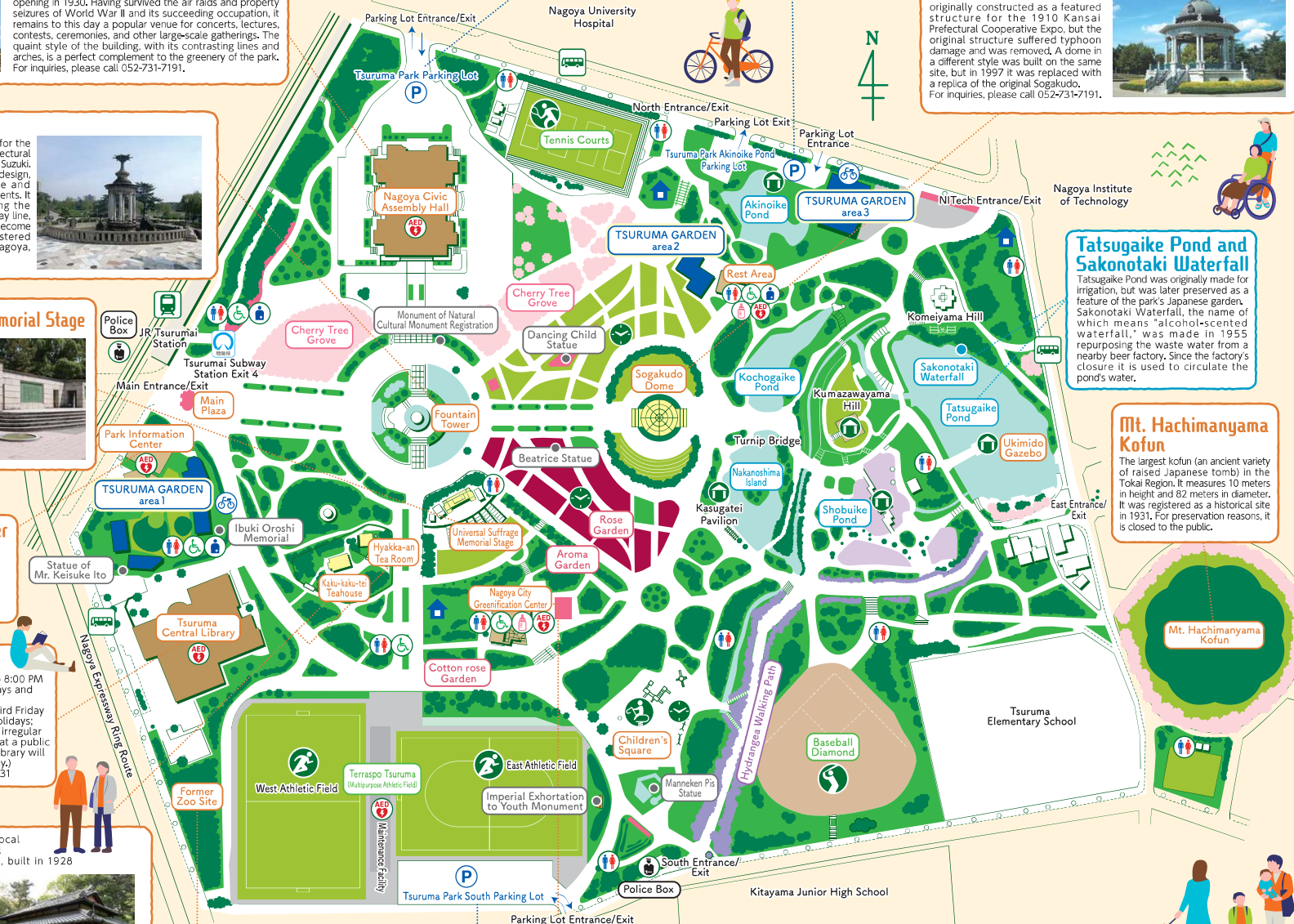
From 1918, when the Nankosho Zoo donated its collection to the city, until 1937, when it moved to its current location at the Higashiyama Zoo, the Nagoya City Zoo operated on this site. Two entrance gateposts still stand at the site as remnants of that era.

Hours of operation: (Entry) 6:00 AM to 0:00 AM (Exit) 24 hours, no closure



## Sogakudo Dome

An Italian Renaissance-style dome with Ars Nouveau embellishments. It was originally constructed as a featured structure for the 1910 Kansai Prefectural Cooperative Expo, but the original structure suffered typhoon damage and was removed. A dome in a different style was built on the same site, but in 1997 it was replaced with a replica of the original Sogakudo. For inquiries, please call 052-731-7191.



## Tatsugaikie Pond and Sakonotaki Waterfall

Tatsugaikie Pond was originally made for irrigation, but was later preserved as a feature of the park's Japanese garden. Sakonotaki Waterfall, the name of which means "alcohol-scented waterfall," was made in 1955 repurposing the waste water from a nearby beer factory. Since the factory's closure it is used to circulate the pond's water.

## Mt. Hachimanyama Kofun

The largest kofun (an ancient variety of raised Japanese tomb) in the Tokai Region. It measures 10 meters in height and 82 meters in diameter. It was registered as a historical site in 1931. For preservation reasons, it is closed to the public.

# TSURUMA PARK Guide Map

Tsuruma Park was established in 1909 as the first public park in Nagoya City. It is known for its cherry blossoms, roses, and irises in particular, and is beloved by the residents of Nagoya as a place for rest, sports, and relaxation. Since its founding, it has incorporated a blend of Japanese and European landscaping, as well as architectural features like the Sogakudo Dome and Fountain Tower, and on July 23rd, and in 2009 the vast majority of the park was registered as a National Natural Cultural Monument. The park is approximately 24 hectares in size.
